Step 1: Create Your Free Account

3	Step 2: Complete "Career Planning Foundations" Activities

(18 questions; S <5 minutes) This activity will help you identify how involved you are in the three primary steps of the career planning process: self-assessment, career exploration, and career planning satisfaction. Your results will help you identify areas of the career planning process where you can improve your engagement. This can help you/your Career Coach select "next steps" in your career planning process.

Step 7: Take Your Next Steps

Now that you have identified some occupations and majors you want to learn more about, a great next step will be to contact DMACC Career Services and set up a career coaching appointment with a member of our staff. At your career coaching appointment, we will...

- Review your assessment results and the notes you have taken in this packet. Either print this packet and bring it with you or save a PDF version of your packet and email it to your Career Coach before your meeting.
- · Talk more in-depth about the occupations and majors you have decided to focus on exploring right now.
- Identify actions you can take to start exploring these areas of interest more deeply.
- · Set realistic goals to keep you on-track and moving forward with your career exploration process.

Exploration activities your Career Coach may recommend for you include...

- Informational Interviews: Interview a professional currently working in the occupation you are exploring. Ask the professional questions about their personal career journey, what it's like to work in their field, and what advice they have for college students who are considering that occupation.
- Job Shadows: Arrange to spend time (half-day, full day, ## hours throughout one week) "shadowing" a professional working in the occupation you are exploring. Job shadowing allows students to get a sense of what a "typical" day or week looks like for professionals who work in that occupation.
- Faculty Interviews: Interview the program chair or another faculty member at DMACC who teaches in the program you are exploring. Learn about the program, its courses, attributes of successful students, and career outcomes for graduates.
- Academic Advising: Meet with the DMACC Academic Advisor who works with the program you are exploring. Academic Advisors can help answer questions about program requirements, class scheduling, and graduation/transfer planning.
- Student Clubs/Organizations: Explore an area of interest by getting involved in one of DMACC's student clubs/organizations. Getting involved with a student club/organization is a great way to network with peers who share similar interests, learn about a particular program or industry, and develop strong teamwork skills.
- Volunteering: Volunteer with a community organization to explore an area of interest. Volunteering is a great way to learn more about something you are passionate about, expand your network, and develop new skills.
- Part-Time Jobs & Internships: Gain hands-on experience working in a field of interest through part-time employment or an internship. These types of experiences help students build their resumes while simultaneously "trying on" a career.
- Counseling: Meet with one of DMACC's Counselors for additional support in addressing possible barriers to career exploration and decision-making including mental health concerns, family struggles, and other stressors.
