Facts About DMACC's Virtual Court Reporting Program

- LIVE virtual instruction is delivered through Blackboard Collaborate or Zoom or Microsoft Teams. These classes are synchronous, and attendance is required. Most classes meet from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday through Thursday.
- Students are required to come to the DMACC Newton campus 4-6 days each semester. See www.dmacc.edu/programs/courtreporting for more details.
- Web-blended and online classes are also offered for flexibility in scheduling.
- Professors are highly qualified and caring, with many years of experience in court reporting, captioning and teaching.
- Classes are designed for completion in two years.
- DMACC has the lowest tuition in lowa.**
- The job market is very strong; court reporters are in high demand in lowa and nationwide.
- Mentor and internship opportunities are offered with the Iowa Court Reporters Association.

*Progress in theory and speed classes is very individualized. Students make progress at different rates, depending on the amount of time spent practicing and the quality of practice. Students should plan to spend 10-18 hours outside of class practicing on their steno machines (in addition to 9–12 hours of class practice).

Technology Requirements

- 1. Steno machine: Luminex CSE (rent or purchase)
- 2. Laptop: Lease from DMACC*
- 3. Internet: Minimum 10 MB
- 4. CAT software: Lease from Eclipse
- 5. Earphones/headphones
- 6. Printer (recommended)

The starting salary for court reporters is approximately \$56,000-65,000 per year.
